Top Ten News

Operation supposedly continues on 15 and 20 Meter CW from China. Initial station BY1PK will be joined, according to *Worldradio*, by a BY7 this Fall, a BY4 next Spring, and another BY1 in a year or so. They are looking for donations of gear for these stations.

VKØHI will be the callsign of the early 1983 Heard Island expedition, according to *Australia's Amateur Radio* magazine. VK6XI reports that the New South Wales Corporate Affairs Commission has approved the submission and registration of the Heard Island Expedition. The International DX Foundation reports that six weeks will be needed for the mountaineering crew to finish their climb, allowing two radio operators to spend enough time to work "everybody." The radio operators, who will not use any "list" type operating, will be selected by the VK6 DX Chasers group, on the basis of both radio prowess and physical stamina.

An article in Australia's *The Australian* newspaper (TNX VK5WO) describes the main purpose of the expedition: to make only the second successful scaling of "Big Ben," the mountain topped by a volcanic cone called Mawson Peak. Big Ben makes up virtually the entire island. As of early July, about twenty-five people from several countries have expressed interest in the expedition, and about half of the \$127,000 has been raised. An important scientific project planned is investigating just how well Heard Island's birds are doing on their diet of small crustaceans called krill. Krill has been considered an important future food source for humans.

TRAVELLING

Ron Bailey, AA4S, has some time on his hands, and wants to volunteer for an expedition to some rare spot, anyplace but China, Burma, Heard, and Malpelo. Those are the ones he still needs! While we hams are interested in what countries we can operate radio from, it is becoming more and more difficult for people of many countries to travel at all. This summer, for example, waiting time for a U.S. passport has been upwards of six weeks, causing some people to have to cancel travel plans for lack of a passport.

The July issue of *Inquiry* magazine carried a story on international travel, stressing how nearly every country on earth is using entry permission as a way of expressing some sort of political view or bias. One example hits close to home: while virtually every Western European country admits U.S. citizens for up to three months without a visa, foreign visitors to the U.S. must not only have a visa but they also face inspections by both Customs and the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service.

Inquiry's reporter listed countries he had had great difficulty entering or had been denied entry entirely: Morocco, Zanzibar, Tanzania, Kenya, Zaire, Ghana, Angola, Mozambique. Others he didn't even try were Afghanistan, Vietnam, Kampuchea, and Iran. Burma, he says, permits a stay of only seven days, requires an "onward" ticket and visa, and permits no overland entry or exit from the country. Passports issued by the South African "homelands" are not recognized by anybody except South Africa.

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(TRAVELLING). One final note which may or may not be encouraging. *Inquiry* says the best hope for getting into many countries is if you can prove you are a journalist. But get your locks cut before departing (longhairs not wanted) and if you're going to Malawi, any women in your group will not be allowed if they wear slacks.

One Minnesota Field Day group last month hosted a government official from North Yemen, and he even did some operating. As a result, the official is returning with intentions of proposing a return of amateur radio legality for 4W. One of the Minnesotans and his wife (both hams) have been invited to spend some time there next year (if the "bill" passes) setting up a station for demo to the officials. They have already made transportation and lodging arrangements, and we'll keep you posted.

Propagation highlights were miserable HF conditions (flares), excellent performance of the USSR RS satellites, a Sporadic E opening to W9/WØ on 2 Meters, and all US call areas on 6 Meters except W6 and W7. EME and 10 GHz were tried without success. Cushcraft and HAL loaned gear for the expedition.

ARRL's DX ADVISORY COMMITTEE has some new members now that there's one for each division instead of each call area. Here's the line-up: K3KA (Atlantic), VE3QA (Canadian), N9MM (Central), WØSFU (Dakota), K5YY (Delta), K8DB (Great Lakes), W2QM (Hudson), WØSR, Chairman (Midwest), W1DA (New England), K7LAY (Northwestern), K6SSJ (Pacific), W4FRU (Roanoke), NØRR (Rocky Mountain), W4VQ (Southeastern), N6RJ (Southwestern), and K5DB (West Gulf). Board Liaison N4MM, Hq liaison W3AZD.

ARRL is coming to the aid of amateurs in Burbank Illinois (Issue 142). Burbank

amateurs are seeking "a preliminary injunction in Federal court against the enforcement of the extremely objectionable ordinance recently enacted in their city and (are seeking) a declaratory judgment overturning the ordinance." ARRL support up to \$7500 has been authorized for the legal battle.

Nothing heard from K6UA out of Bangladesh (Issue 150) but "S21CW" was on 14225 at 1800 July 19, saying his name was Don and QSL to SM5DNC. No other info available.

Ex-7Q7RM, Ron Macfarlane wrote confirming much of what we knew about amateur radio in Malawi and adding a few twists. He reiterated that the police siezed all ham equipment in March 1976 and that there has been no legitimate operation from 7Q since then, except for 7Q7LW, who is a policeman. Macfarlane is from Scotland and has lived in Malawi for twenty-seven years; he lost his equipment along with the rest of the 7Q7's in 1976 (most of whom have left by now). Ron has been trying for some time to get his hamming privileges back, and a few letters to the authorities might help. Write to The Postmaster General, PO BOX 537, Blantyre, Malawi. Or try Minister of Transport and Communications, Private Bag 322, Lilongwe 3, Malawi. And don't tell them your wife wears slacks.

We're not the only ones affected by the Rotten Band Conditions. *Westlink Report* says many of the Europeans operating just below the 10 Meter band are moving their operations to 6-6.5 MHz. Most of these operators use "IB" or KB" prefixed calls and concentrate around 6.2 MHz.

Alex, VK9YA, has been a mainstay of Cocos-Keeling activity the past few years, as his air force duties take him there several times a year. He's being shipped off to Malaysia for two years soon and hopes to get a license allowing him to operate both 9M2 and 9M8. VK9NYG is still active from Cocos on 15 and 10 Meters only; he's trying to learn the code now.

WØLHS's column in the latest *RTTY Journal* has some interesting comments on South Pole propagation, courtest of W7XU, who's stationed at KC4AAA. Arliss, who will be there until November, says polar absorption

events which have little effect in the States can be devastating at the South Pole. That sounds logical. Aurora does more damage at stations farther north on the ice cap (at McMurdo and Siple) and that snow and ice static are also big problems.

Incidentally, the RTTY operator at VE1SPI was going great guns until the power supply in the hf rig they were using died. RTTY activity seems to be picking up with the availability of and interest in new "electronic RTTY" equipment. It's a small jump from a home computer to amateur teletype, and a number of RTTY DXCC certificates have been awarded. WØLHS's column in *RTTY Journal* mentioned a lot of good DX on the mode: KC4, ZL/Chatham, HBØ, HC8, 9M2, XT2, 5B4, KH2, UR2, FWØ, 5N, 9K2, 5H3, 9V1, 3A2, and loads of garden variety stuff.

P.S. The "mailing" part of page four is upside down for a reason: it goes through our addressing machine better that way.
