what are you doing in 1987? Probably not working much DX on 28 MHz, that's for sure. David Meisel, in his Mail-A-Prop (54 Westview Crescent, Geneseo NY 14454), makes some predictions of solar flux values for the upcoming five years. The average value centered around January, 1982, was 178. Meisel prognosticates that January values to come are 152 (1983), 127 (1984), 105 (1985), 82 (1986), and 73 (1987). Sunspot numbers are predicted to fall from January, 1982's 135 to a low of thirteen at the beginning of 1987.

NEWS

BY IPK continues to show on CW only, both 20 and 15 Meters, at the right propagation times, about once a week for a handful of contacts. BY8AA appeared on 15 CW last week, with a tremendous chirp to his/her signal. We are skeptical, what with all the commercial equipment sitting around the People's Republic of China, waiting to be used. Heard Island expedition organizers are quiet now as

they count their pennies (Issue 164): have you sent yours yet?

Take a look at the other eighteen DXCC countries in our last year's Top Twenty; eight of them are barren rocks: India's Laccadives and Andamans, Bouvet, San Felix, Malpelo, Brazil's Peter/Paul, Crozet, and Kermadec. PYØ P/P and Crozet will drop out this year (FB8WG, incidentally, leaves for France Nov 27), but the others show no sign of impending activation.

Now take a look at the other ten countries in the Top Twenty: Albania, Kampu-chea, S. Yemen, Burma, Viet Nam, N. Yemen, Afghanistan, the United Arab Emirates, Chad, and Laos. There sure are a lot of Worker's Paradises there.

That FO8 Clipperton operation making the rumor mill rounds lately was supposed to have started Nov 8, but nothing heard from them as of the llth. We aren't holding our breath! F6BBJ is said to be asking for donations to his upcoming African tour, but he didn't even bother to contact all the appropriate publications. His list of stops (Issue 163) featured only 3Cl and 3CØ. Speaking of 3Cl Equatorial Guinea, we are looking for reports on 3ClMM, who appears infrequently on CW. As for the other stops by F6BBJ, they have all been active in the past couple of years.

One of the locals got a phone call from the FCC monitoring station in Belfast, Maine, as he was observed operating on 10109.7 KHz. Be warned that the feds are really watching that off limits "window" on the new band. We heard a tale that one DXer is now up to twenty-three DXCC countries on 10 MHz. Taking you higher, local vhf'er K1FO upgraded his Moonbounce array and promptly, in a weekend, pushed his 2 Meter EME DXCC total to seventeen!

SMØAJU and SMØDJZ, operating 5H3BH from Tanzania Nov 24 to Dec 6, will work CW during the CQ CW Contest and concentrate on phone before and after the 'test; they'll pay special attention to 40 and 80 Meters both during and outside the contest, and you'll likely find them up 50 kHz on 10-20 and up 25 kHz on 40/80.

Some good news is that YIIBGD is showing fairly regularly from Baghdad, exclusively on 20 SSB. Best times are 1300-1500 and 0100-0300Z. These are all list operations.

VK9ZR Mellish QSLs continue to dribble in; it seems the policy was last in, first out. We got our LU3ZY QSL last week, almost a year to the day after our one-and-only ever South Sandwich contact; the darned thing doesn't say S. Sandwich anywhere on it...it is a multi-purpose "club QSL" with most of the information typed in. No wonder it takes them so long to QSL! VEISPI St. Paul cards have now been printed and will begin mailing, courtesy VE3EUP, shortly.

The official TDXB policy on the new 10 MHz band is this ... we are eager to have your reports and observations, especially as the onset of winter approaches and conditions get better. We think that the first new hf band to open up in thirty years is an exciting event. We are, to be honest, astounded at the almost complete lack of mention of the new band in our competitor's newsletters. Incidentally, the second issue of Amateur Radio Today (see Issue 165) has some information on modifications to Yaesu, Kenwood, Drake, and ICOM rigs for 10 MHz use. It is interesting to note that most manufacturers were not prepared to provide the necessary information, even though they've known the band was coming for three years.

Another unfortunate sign of the times is announcement from Syria's Technical Institute of Radio that they will celebrate "35 years of amateur radio" in Syria with a special event callsign on SSB only. They say "Amateur radio activity in Syria began in 1947 by the efforts of one man: Rasheed Jalal (YK1AA) when nobody knew anything about this hobby here." Look for 6C35A, 6C35M, 6C35N, and 6C350 Dec 25/26 and Dec 30/31, on 10-80 Meters.

This may be The Year for 160 and 80 Meters; some of the multi-operator stations are reported to have worked upwards of forty DXCC countries on 160 during the CQ Phone Contest last month. KIJX, operating singleband 80, worked 83 countries and 22 zones. That will be close to the record for 80 Meters set by WICF four years ago. If you are country-hunting on 80, do some serious listening below 3700 and even below 3600; if you can't transmit SSB there call the station you want on CW. And don't forget the peak period for long path on 80 is the first week of December.

Karl Renz, K4YT, filed the following report on his latest assignment in Africa, which ended late in Oct (he'll go again in January):

Karl operated 5Z4RK and 5Y4ITU while in Kenya, using his IC730. He votes for a smaller and lighter power supply for that rig. Two other Americans are stationed at the embassy in Nairobi...Bryan, 5Z4DS/ AH6AT, and Doyle, 5Z4DE/N4VV. Both will be there two more years.

The ever-pleasant authorities at the Entebbe airport in Uganda were not impressed by K4YT's diplomatic passport, and Karl says they treated him to a measure of verbal abuse. Karl eventually saw the PTT gnomes but his hopes for a license were dashed...seems since Carl and Martha Henson were there the procedures have been changed. Karl filed an application and is hoping for 5X5YT next time he is in Uganda.

In Adis Ababa, Karl discovered, through talking with Girma, ET3PG, that security people closed down the police radio station (where most of the hamming had been from). They waited until Girma was in Hungary to do this, but Girma is trying to get the station back on the air again.

K4YT's itinerary for the trip beginning in January includes some fascinating spots but many of them will probably allow no possibility for amateur radio. We'll give you the run-down in the next couple of weeks.
