CHINA

Two new opportunities to work the People's Republic of China are developing. Station BY8AA, mentioned last week, is very authentic, according to a postcard received from the managers of BY1PK in Peking. BY8AA is in the capital city of Chengtu, Szechwan Province. Chengtu is about 400 miles east of the Tibetan border and 750 miles almost due north of Hanoi. Operation by "Xxan" and "Lml" began Nov 4, and the very chirpy CW is attributed to poor power line regulation. Our first reliable word of the new station came from reader Arch Doty, K8CFU, who was in China when the announcement was made. BY8AA has been heard only on 15 Meter CW, with a big signal into the U.S. West Coast and Midwest around 0100Z, and the operators seemed fairly experienced. Xxan was trained at the BY1PK station earlier this year. QSLs go to BY1PK, PO Box 6106, Beijing, P.R.C.

Three operators from Japan, including Kan Mizoguchi, have received permission to operate BY1PK in the \underline{CQ} WW CW Contest Nov 27/28, and on the Monday after (Nov 29). (Kan is JAlBK).

"OHØW - the one being called the most massive contest effort in the history of Amateur Radio looked more like the world's biggest pancake after the first six hours of the Contest" (\underline{CQ} \underline{WW} Phone). "The northern lights were very romantic, blazing the skies on the Arctic Circle."

'However, through the dynamite efforts of all individuals involved, the station managed to push the score up to 11,500 QSOs and 21 megapoints, and rack up an all-time European record. YASME REPORT - ABU AIL NEXT!

Iris Colvin, W6QL, and Lloyd Colvin, W6KG, completed J2ØDU Djibouti operations Nov 8, after three weeks which produced 7000 contacts in 155 countries. That was a new record for them for a three-week stint (aided by the $\underline{\text{CQ}}$ WW Phone Contest).

The Colvins will open from Abu Ail Dec 2 for forty-eight hours, signing G5ACI/AA. The YASME Foundation has held the callsign G5ACI for ten years, and the Abu Ail effort is characterized by Iris and Lloyd as the "most difficult, most dangerous, and most Expensive" YASME DXpedition ever. They stress that all QSLs are to go to the standard YASME address (PO BOX 2025, Castro Valley CA 94546). Abu Ail operation will be "continuous," all bands, both CW and 'phone.

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A clarification of information on Heard Island which appeared in Issue 164: the Wireless Institute of Australia is not funding or organizing the Operation which we endorsed. The "VK6 DX Chasers Club" is responsible on the Australian end, with the International DX Foundation and the Northern California DX Foundation providing support in the U.S. According to Bruce Barthols, VK3UV, editor of Amateur Radio (the official journal of the WIA), "The Federal Executive of the WIA believed that it was proper to encourage this expedition, and it has done so through the pages of Amateur Radio."

10 MHz: top score reported on the new band is 26 DXCC countries and all continents, from Wl. According to the ARRL Letter (Issue 2), our local friend was not the only one to hear from the FCC for straying into the verbotem territory on 10 MHz; ARRL reports FCC has been quite busy monitoring the "window."

A <u>special</u> <u>station</u> will be operated by the Ni-gerian Amateur Radio Society at Lagos' Specialized International Trade Fair Nov 20-29, signing 5NØSIF. No QSL info available.

Poland's club station SP5PZK has been active again on an irregular basis, and operator Toly says private SP stations are expected to return to the air before long. Dec 13 will be the first anniversary of martial law in Poland and the banning of amateur radio.

The <u>Third Tokyo DX Convention</u> will be next Feb 5 and 6 at the Kudan-Kaikan Hotel, near the royal palace in Tokyo. More information can be obtained from JA1KSO.

And the <u>International DX Convention</u>, this year sponsored by the No. California DX Club, will be April 22-24, 1983, at the Holiday Inn in Visalia. Convention general chairman is Bill Zachman, W6TPH, and program co-chairpersons are Jan and Jay O'Brien, K6HHD and W6GO. Attention clubs: send two sets of labels addressed to your members to the NCDXC, and your members will receive mailings on the convention. NCDXC: PO BOX 608, Menlo Park, CA 94025. Your club mailing list will not be used for any other purpose.

Several readers report that Kenwood is stonewalling on any information on updating their equipment to WARC bands. OST magazine has scheduled an article on a 3-band Kenwood mod for next March or April. That will, coincidentally, be about the time that ARRL membership dues are increased from \$25 to \$27.50.

Rick Dorsch, WB8ABN, is home in Michigan "permanently" after nine years in Ecuador as HClEE. He has IRCs to peddle at 40 cents each, minimum order one hundred, to 1745 Oakstone Drive, Rochester MI 48063.

ARRL says BV2A/B will be allowed on 40 and 80 Meters beginning about Dec 1; no mention of whether specific frequencies are mandated.

Wayne Green, W2NSD, did show from one spot on his current Asian jaunt...9M8PW. Might pay to look for VS5WG this week.

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HAVE YOU WORKED EVERY VAL, VLAD, AND YURI?

Here's something to add spice to your DXing... USSR Oblast hunting. You can specialize in any country with a large amateur radio population (e.g. Japan, England, Germany, Brazil); I have chosen the U.S.S.R., which is workable from here just about round-the-clock on one band or an-

My interest in chasing Russian oblasts came from K3EST's reputation for having "almost all of them," and the first step was to find out what "all of them" means. I dug up a list of oblasts put together by WIYL in 1977; there are about 180 of them, and working a hundred qualifies you for the R-100-0 award. To date, only PAØBE has worked all the oblasts (outside the U.S.S.R.) although K3EST's application is said to be in process.

Oblasts, as defined by the R-100-0 Award, differ somewhat from the real political divisions in the USSR (some of the divisions are krays, autonomous SSRs, autonomous oblasts or nationality okrugs, but that's a topic all its own). In general, an Oblast represents some type of political district. As the USSR changes, oblasts are added and deleted.

The best thing about working oblasts is you needn't ask each operator which oblast he or she is in...the callsign will tell you. There are even a few oblasts with no resident operators but which host occasional DXpeditions. Sort of like DXCC. All the ingredients are there for serious attention.

With only a few exceptions, the number in the callsign and the first letter following it will tell you which oblast (and therefore which DXCC country, CQ zone, and ITU zone) the station is in. Most special calls follow the same rule, but those callsigns issued before 1970 may not. Pre-1970 callsigns are the ones with only a two-letter suffix, such as UAlDZ, UF6CR, UWØLT. Even some of these still follow the rule.

After a look through your QSL collection (Russian QSLs invariably have their oblast on them -ed.), you may find from 100 to 120 of them but there will most likely be big gaps, especially in the hard-to-work 7th and 8th call areas. You will discover that one of those you need is a nuclear testing area or a spacecraft landing site or a district created because it was predominantly of one ethnic group. You will find the QTH given by most Russians is likely to be the capital of their oblast.

Once you begin to figure out where all of the various oblasts are you'll have a slight edge over the next person because you know that a UA90 is in CQ Zone 18 and UA9J is in Zone 17, or that the ARRL DXCC list only shows the commonly worked oblasts and the UK8XBD you worked is really a UJ8!
