HEARD ISLAND: IT'S ALL OVER BUT THE SHOUTING

VKØJS, VKØNL, and VKØSJ will open from Heard about January 16, with operators VK9NS, VK9NL, WA8MOE, W7SE, and OELLO. All bands and modes; they request that each DXer limit himself to one contact per mode. The operation, sponsored by the Heard Island DX Association, will last about two weeks.

VKØHI will open about February 1 for an operation slated to last over a month, with operators K8CW, N4BQW, and VK3DHF. This expedition is co-sponsored by the "VK6 DX Chasers Club," the Northern California DX Foundation, and the International DX Foundation.

CHINA: very few reports coming in on BY8AA, none on BY1PK. VE7BC has said that the chirpy signal from BY8AA is due to an old transmitter, not power line regulation. It should be kept in mind that from N. America BY1PK is about the same beam heading as Japan, while BY8AA is more like Bangladesh.

J1BKC reports that during his BY1PK operation the weekend of the CQ WW DX CW Contest (Nov 27/28) they worked about 350 contacts in five hours. Kan said he did some talking to operators at BY1PK regarding contest operation, and hopes they will be active in next July's IARU Radiosport Championship. Kan also advises that the BY1PK QSL card is too big to fit a standard envelope (4X6 in).

IRAQ: W1FZ is NOT QSL manager for Y1LBGD (as published in another sheet). Jim says an address to try is Kamal Abdul Hadi, Al-Kadimiyah, Al-Ayimmah Bridge, House No. 24/6, Baghdad, Iraq. Y1LBGD continues active on 14 MHz SSB mostly weekends around 15-16Z.

FB8ZQ is very active from Amsterdam Island, mostly 20 CW (see Bandpass). FB8XAB is reported to be showing in some French nets, ala the early days of FB8WG; try 21170 and 14110 at various times. FB8WH and FB8WI are starting to show on 20 CW around 1700Z.

W1JR has worked and confirmed all fifty states on 30 Meters (the tenth band he has made WAS on). Joe says he hears a certain VE1 has worked 72 DXCC countries on the new band! We have not seen any USSR stations on yet.

80 METERS: W1JR also reports that VU2BX transmits on 3701 and listens on 3501. QRZ DX says Australians can now transmit SSB 3794-3800, as of 16 Dec. PA3BXC/3A2 will be on Jan 1 to Mar 1, emphasizing 80 and 40 Meters, mostly SSB.

OH2BH reports that casualties included an unsuccessful helicopter landing try on Market Reef, and a 40-minute power outage on Sunday morning, which the group figures cost them 300,000 points.

80 METERS... Time is running out on this season's maximum band conditions but a few weeks remain. Both evening and morning openings have been good for all the U.S., especially to Asia. One of the most sought-after stations is YB5AES, John Sharpe, who says:

"I'll be here for four or five years, as the Area Land Manager for Caltex, Indonesia's largest oil producer. Only the long path to the states is worthwhile here, with VE1ZZ and W3MFW being the two most consistent signals in the 2200-2330Z time period. The opening at 1100Z is usually a washout because that's when the static from our monsoons peaks. At 2200Z,, Europeans and Asiatic USSR stations are pretty loud, but they fade about 2300Z and this appears to be the optimum time.

"Another problem is the numerous military tactical stations coming from SE Asia with clicky, chirpy signals and even AM on the low end of 80. VU stations on SSB are also a problem.

"I am interested in 160 Meters also, and hope to make it to the USA for a "first." I didn't hear a single USA station during the ARRL 160 Meter Contest Dec 4/5. Unfortunately, there being no long path on 1.8 MHz, the 1100-1300Z time period is the only one possible, and my QRN levels will limit me to working West Coast and perhaps W5. I have worked a number of Europeans, as well as 4X4 and HZ1 around 21Z.

"I use an 80-Meter open wire fed dipole sixty-six feet high on all bands, tying the feeders together and feeding against some radials for 160 and lately for 80, also. During my year at 9V1UY I didn't work either 80 or 160, and have been on those bands from Indonesia only since August of '82. I've worked sixty-two countries on 80 and nineteen on 160."

AMATEUR RADIO IN GHANA? One of our readers is with the government in Ghana, a country on which we have reported previously. There has been no legal activity from there in a year, since the Dec 31, 1981 coup which brought the People's National Defense Committee to power. Amateur radio was then banned for "security reasons" and transmitters were confiscated, mostly from aliens who had been granted amateur radio licenses on the basis of their holding tickets from their home country.

At the time of the coup, even most commercial transmitters were confiscated; some of them returned to service in March and April of 1982. Last July, an amateur station was on from Ghana without permission, and the operator was subsequently jailed. The major block to the return of amateur radio in Ghana is that the PNDC simply does not understand amateur radio; the civilian bureaucrats running the department which would issue licenses is hesitant to take the matter to the PNDC. These authorities want a more structured licensing system than that of past years, which allowed licensing of persons who could not have passed a US or European amateur radio exam. It is reported that only about five per cent of the previously-licensed 9G station operators knew any CW.

A PRESS RELEASE FROM KL7IHP

"We are pleased to announce that a team from Bash Educational Services Inc will be making a spring, 1983 DXpedition to Hong Kong and will be operating KL7IHP/VS6. It is possible that a simultaneous operation will be run from Macao under the callsign CR9FE.

"The Hong Kong group will operate SSB and CW 10-20 Meters and possibly 40 and 80 Meters. It is also hoped to work the American Novice band on 10 and 15 Meters. Macao, if approval to operate is received and all arrangements are made in time, will be SSB only and 10-20 M.

"Hong Kong KL7IHP/VS6 operation will be twenty hours a day Mar 26 to April 2. The Macao group's dates of operation will be announced on the air (from Hong Kong). We'll be using an IC740 and IC-2KL loaned by ICOM America. QSLs to KL7IHP Callbook address."

PRESS RELEASE FROM YASME

The G5ACI/AA Abu Ail trip went pretty much as planned, the four operators being Lloyd Colvin, W6KG, Iris Colvin, W6QL, Christian Dumont, F0ECV, and Jean Michel Gabouriaud, F6GBQ. The trip from Djibouti featured very rough seas, but no problems on the return trip. Landing and loading/unloading from a small dinghy is difficult and dangerous.

We got our three transceivers, one amplifier, tri-band beam and miscellaneous items on the rock in about four hours, then operated two stations for forty one hours, making 4,000 contacts in 104 different countries (including some operating on 10 MHz).

Incidentally, from Abu Ail one can see N. Yemen to the east and Ethiopia to the West. Abu Ail itself is an international island. QSL all, as usual, to YASME, PO Box 2025, Castro Valley, CA 94546.

EXCERPTS: IDXF WINTER NEWSLETTER

President John Ackley, KP2A, reports that the International DX Foundation has grown to over a thousand members in four years. Their DX Advisory Committee of N6CW, K8CW, and KB2XS is supplemented by a staff of over a dozen. IDXF is a Delaware corporation without stock, whose officers are appointed by a three-person Board of Directors.

IDXF has purchased six new complete stations, of which three are presently in Nepal and some are going to Heard. The stations are IC-740s, Hy-Gain TH2 beams, and peripheral equipment.

The newsletter profiles Al Fischer, K8CW, one of the recent Peter/Paul Rocks operators. Al is presently in Perth, signing VK6AHI, waiting to leave for Heard island in two weeks.
