HEARD ISLAND

As this issue goes to press (Jan 13) rumors are flying that the HIDXA (Jim Smith) expedition, which left Tasmania Jan 3, had to turn back on Jan 6. Three possible reasons are given for scuttling the trip...failure of navigation equipment, improper credentialing of the captain and first mate, and ship mechanical troubles. However, all this is merely conjecture. If the rumors are untrue, look for VKØJS, and VKØNL, to come on just about now, Jan 17.

The other expedition to Heard, VKØHI, is reied proceeding smoothly, and they expect to be on the air also about Jan 17. That operation will last at least several weeks.

Low Band Conditions have been nothing short of phenomenal, as this week's Bandpass will attest. 80 Meters in particular has been quite good, with long path openings occuring several weeks later in the season than is normal. A reminder that the CQ 160 Meter CW Contest is Jan 28-30, and new scoring rules allow two points for contacting your own country, five points for other countries in your continent, and ten points for contacts outside your continent. Complete rules are in January CQ Magazine.

Connecticut Hams: an organizational meeting of the new Connecticut DX Association will take place Wed, Jan 19, in beautiful downtown Andover, at the home of WB1EAZ. Get details and directions by phoning TDXB at 871-7699.

<u>South Atlantic Islands</u>: see the Calendar for information on operations from Antarctica, South Shetlands, and South Orkneys, over the next month or so.

Tom Gregory, N4NW, with the Department of State in Accra, Ghana, aimed for Guinea-Bissau, J5, on Jan 12/13, then N4NW/6W Senegal, on the 14th and 15th, followed by two more weeks in Togo, Jan 15-24, as either 5V7HL of 5V7NW. QSL all tom's operations to AK3F. N4NW continues trying to open doors to operate from several couns in the area which have not been heard in some time.

Steve Gecewicz, KØCS, is back with a report on his Operation Insomnia. He made 3,000 contacts, including 900 on 75 Meters, from the following: FOØQA Fr. Polynesia, ZKIXS S. Cooks, 5WIEA Western Samoa, A35ZZ Tonga, and KØCS/KH8 American Samoa. Best 80 Meter conditions were Dec 29 from Tonga, and worst were during the ZKIXS stint (only ninety contacts). Steve used an FR101ZD, dipoles, and an MLA-2500 on American Samoa. QSL all to KØCS.

Rusty Epps, W6OAT, says he had a blast during the recent 9N38 operation, which was conceived by WB4NFO as part of the national celebration of the 38th birthday of the King of Nepal. Rusty, along with WB4NFO, WA6YOU, K7AW, JIIVLV, and JM1RFT, made about 5,000 contacts half-and-half CW and SSB, and some on 40/80 Meters, although noise levels were generally prohibitive. This operation was a follow-up to WB4NFO's 9N33 five years ago, and there is already talk of a 9N43 as time marches on.

They were forced to use low power on 80, as their linear's bandswitch didn't work on 3.5. Including 3400 contacts in the CQ WW CW Contest, their 80-10 Meter band totals were 128, 1044, 3265, 2778, and 3249, 60 percent being on CW. QSLs to 5H3BH Nov 23 to Dec 6 go to SMØDJZ, otherwise 5H3BH to the SMØEAI Callbook address.
