ZONE 23: Most North Americans who have completed 5-Band WAZ worked UØY on all bands back in the Fall of 1979. Now, UWØMF reports that another expedition is taking shape for this year, Oct 1 to Nov 31. They'll sign UØY again, on "all bands and modes," and work the  $\underline{CQ}$  WW Phone Contest at the end of October. More info as it is available.

ZS22A came on 20 CW the week of May 16, claiming to be on Marion Island. A call to his WA4 "manager" brought a negative response. He was worked at 0300Z on 14025.

KAMPUCHEA: according to the Japan DX News, JAIUT and JAIHQG met Prime Minister San Son at Bansange. They say San Son has expressed an interest in activating an amateur station in Kampuchea. Money is being collected in Japan to support the venture.

HCJB, "The Voice of the Andes," will contribute to the celebration of World Communications Year by operating amateur station HClJB June 11 and 12. HClJB was assigned to Clarence Moore, an American, who invented the cubical quad...he was chief engineer at HCJB in the 1950's. The broadcast station was so high in altitude that static was a continuing problem, which Moore correctly perceived could be alleviated by a closed-loop antenna.

The HClJB operation will utilize antennas at HCJB's transmitting site at Pifo, Ecuador; all operation will be SSB, 10-40 Meters. On 21445 KHz, they'll be using a 24-element quad (24 dB gain), which is aimed at Europe. The 14245 station will feature a new steerable antenna system, rated at 24 dB gain, which HCJB uses to broadcast to Europe on the 25 Meter SW band. There will also be SSB on 7045, and possibly some Oscar 8 work. QSL to HClJB, Casilla 691, Quito, Ecuador.

CHINA: the operators at BY1PK are aware of a brief opening to North America on 20, at around 1500-1530Z; it might be wise to listen for them then at 14050. This opening would favor the West Coast, be marginal in the Midwest, and probably not usable to the East Coast until autumn.

KC6SZ E. Carolines operation Mar 18-27 by JA6BSM netted about 15,000 contacts, including 4000 in the <u>CQ</u> WPX Contest. JA6BSM is manager for that operation only, <u>not</u> for KC6IN.

A recent (May 16) QSO with a Polish station indicated that about five hundred SP's are now active, but another thousand still await authorization...when the ban was lifted last winter TDXB predicted it would be the end of 1983 before most former SP's were on again.

TRINDADE: PY1EFW/PYØT rumored leaving soon.

DX News Sheet (England) says CP6EL and others will activate Trindade Jun 5-15, but we can't verify that.

BANGLADESH: various European sources continue to report S2BTF on SEANET (14320/1200Z), but no reports in North America. It is curious that Peter, a Britisher, would be able to activate his license (he was active briefly in 1979/early 1980), while the recent JA group was unable to get their equipment into the country.

> "RESCUED RADIO HAM: 'IT WAS REAL HELL.'" by Jim Gilchrist

"THE FOUR lucky-to-be alive survivors of the stricken yacht, Sidharta, spoke of their 10-day ordeal when they stepped ahhore in Hong Kong yesterday (April 22).

"'It was real hell,' said the West German radio ham, Mr. Drobnica Baldur (48), after spending 243 hours drifting helplessly without food and water in the South China Sea. All four survivors, including the skipper's wife, Ms Jenny Toh Swee Neo, looked remarkably unscathed after the 10-day sea rescue drama. The skipper, Mr. Peter Marx, speaking shortly after he landed, said one reason they had survived was probably the fact that they had a big meal, with a lot to drink, just one hour before the yacht sank.

"He said they had also drunk a lot the day before. They had not had any food or water with them on the dinghy and there was no rain during their ten days adrift. 'It was perfect holiday weather, he said. He revealed that the dinghy had also been damaged during the shooting and had holes which they stuffed with their T-shirts. But one of them always had to be awake to bail water out of the dinghy. Mr Marx had nothing but praise for the way they were treated on board the Panamanian-registered container ship, Linden, which rescued them.

"Although the first thing he asked for was a beer, all he received was a small glass of water. They were all given small amounts of warm water each hour so as not to upset their systems. They were also only given small rations of food on the first day. 'The captain said it would have been dangerous to have beer. It was very frustrating to see the big flagon of water and only be given a mouthful though' Mr Marx said.

"The medical treatment they received must also have been good, because doctors at the hospital where they were examined discharged them in under two hours. Looking sunburnt and with skin peeling off his face and arms, Mr Marx said Mr Norbert Willand was the worst off for sunburn, with swollen feet that he could hardly walk on. Mr Marx, who was shot in the right shoulder, said he was lucky that the bullet had gone right through. Mr Marx was uncertain about his future. He said when the Sidharta, of which he was co-owner, went down, he lost both his accommodation and his livelihood. All he wants to do now is get back to Singapore, where he has lived for the past fifteen years and find somewhere else to live. Of his adventure, all he would say was that it was a calculable risk, going to the Spratly Islands, and of course they did not know there were soldiers there.

"Captain Tadashi Inose, the Japanese master of the Linden, revealed they were just thirty minutes away from being marooned for another night of danger. 'It was very lucky that we spotted them in fine weather and just half an hour before sunset,' said the captain after arriving in Hongkong. The survivors' dinghy was spotted 230 miles from where they sent their last mayday message, an island called Amboyna Cay. Another day at sea could have been fatal for the four, who claimed they were attacked by Vietnamese troops. They have no proof of their claims.

"Radio ham Mr Diethelm Mueller (DJ4EI) was shot and lost overboard in the attack on Sunday, April 10. His friend, Mr Gero Band (DJ3NG), from Cologne, died from dehydration and was buried at sea shortly before the rescue. The West German government has condemned the shelling of the yacht and warned that it would make representations to the country responsible.

"(At) a press conference, reporters were banned from asking detailed questions. Mr Baldur, speaking in German, told what happened:

'We are a harmless crew of amateur radio enthusiasts trying to set up a transmitter from one of the ten rarest places you can get in the worldit is prized because nobody goes there. We are an experienced group and did not do things in a careless way,' he said.

"(He said) the crew did not know the Spratlys were occupied by Vietnamese troops, but saw military-looking buildings on their first destination, Amboyna Cay. 'We had already decided to head for another island about twenty miles away when the soldiers opened fire. There was no way to identify their nationality.'

"'The first shot went into the water but the second salvo hit the captain heavily in the chest; he kept the boat under control and tried to hold our course to our new destination. Then our fuel tanks and two gas bottles ignited. The boat was on fire.

"'We had to leave but they kept firing at us with fragment shells. By chance the line to our dinghy burned through and Jenny dived in to get it. Diethelm Mueller was already dead. Even when we were in the dinghy they kept shooting.'

"'We had no water, no bread, not anything else to eat and we had only swimsuits to wear - it was real hell, ' said Mr Baldur."
