Many questions, a few answers

VU7WCY - Laccadives

There is no indication as we write this (1/19) of when VU7WCY will be finished; we have heard rumors of the weekend of Jan 21 and also of Jan 28. The license is good into March. QSL manager VU2GDG has implied that QSLs addressed to VU7WCY without the operator's suffix appended would not be valid. This could be a real problem for those who worked the first group, since they signed their whole call so seldom and usually, when they did, they were covered by policemen and the pileup itself.

Another problem is what to send with your QSL...no one seems very certain if dollar bills are OK or not. Another problem is that there are two managers: VU2APE for the first operation (through Jan 5) and VU2GDG for the second VU7WCY (Jan 9 on). We all have this straight now, but a year or more down the road there will be much confusion, with cards undoubtedly ending up with the wrong manager. This is a result of little if any planning or forethought on the part of the Indian amateurs.

20 Meter openings have so far been good for East of the Mississippi in the mornings, but very marginal for the far Midwest and non-existent for the West Coast. W6/W7 have had their best shot 01-02Z long path, although the openings have been pretty brief. A few people have worked VU7WCY on 80 Meters, mostly on SSB using outrageous splits...the Laccadives have transmitted on 3521, listening 3799, and have also been on 3896. Whoever chose 3896 was certainly unfamiliar with the 75-Meter band!

Finally, VU2GDG has been hinting of an Andamans Islands operation coming...stay tuned!

HONOR ROLL CHANGES

SEE PAGE 66 of January QST for details of changes in ARRL's DXCC Honor Roll administration. In 1984, the Honor Roll will appear twice: in the traditional March QST slot (deadline for that one was Dec 30), and in June QST (submission deadline for that listing is Mar 31, 1984). Beginning in 1985 there will be only one Honor Roll listing, each June. In order for your callsign to appear in boldface print in the December QST Annual List, your callsign must have appeared in a previous Honor Roll list. And in order to call yourself a card-carrying member of the Honor Roll, your call must have appeared in QST in the Honor Roll listing first. That means that if you submit your last QSL to make Honor Roll on April 1, 1984, you will not appear in the Honor Roll list and will not get your lapen pin until June, 1985!

ARRL INTERNATIONAL DX COMPETITION

NOT TOO EARLY to plan for the CW Contest Feb 18/19, and for the Phone weekend Mar 3/4. This activity differs from all others because the format is the U.S. and Canada working everybody else, and everybody else working only W/VE. Because North America is the most heavily populated area of HF activity and because many gargantuan contest stations appear only on contest weekends, the opportunities for propagation study are numerous. Ten Meters may not have been open on the N. Atlantic path for months, but on Contest Weekend, with hundreds of N.American stations pumping multi-gallons onto 28 MHz, the band will probably "open."

This contest is also an excellent way for overseas amateurs to work toward 5-Band WAS, since the U.S. exchange includes one's state. It's an easy way to work toward both 5BWAS and 5BDXCC, as you can work a contest station on five or six bands, and QSL all at once for one price. Finally, while the CQ WW Contest in the Fall is best for the high bands, the ARRL Competition has the best time slot for the Low Bands (which have been fabulous this year). And do yourself a favor...obtain, and use, the official ARRL logsheets, dupe sheets, and operating aids. As the contest weekends approach, keep checking IDXB's Calendar for listings of expeditions.

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TIME FOR ONE OF OUR OCCASIONAL RUNS DOWN THE TDXB Countries-Needed Survey list and sum up activity...incidentally, you will have your response sheet for the 1984 Survey around March.

Three countries active in the Top Ten: Laccadives , of course, XUISS Cambodia not heard for a couple of weeks (rumored rig breakdown) and sporadic activity from the three Chinese stations. There are still rumblings that the Indians will keep trying for an Andamans operation this year. No word lately from Finland on their efforts to get Albania on. "A6ASS" was on from the U.A.E. (#15) Jan 14 but we have our doubts. #17 Kermadec is expected next month, by the HIDXA. ARRL'S DXAC recently voted to keep Spratly (#20) on the list.

Better news in #21-30; Clipperton FOØXX starts the first week of March, KC7UU/Nigeria has set his sights on 5U Niger this spring, and the Radio Club Venezuela has announced an Aves Island (#27) operation to start Feb 7, according to YV5DWB. Taiwan, Number 28 last year, remains a mystery...it was #60 in our 1980 Survey, then crept up through numbers 49 and 48 in '81 and '82. Will be interesting to see if last Fall's I2MQP/BV operation had any worldwide effect ..

Further down the list... 5R8AL is again active, several days a week on about 21.335 at 1800Z; he will make a 30 wpm CW contact with you if you ask. YIIBGD is more active these days, and at least one person we know got a QSL via OE2EEG. From there down the list we run into DXCC countries which are perenials in the bottom 35 or so. When we mail the Survey forms to you this Spring we will, of course, make our Fearless Prognostications of the results!

Four years ago in TDXB

JANUARY, 1980: We began that new year with the Bandpass organized by Continents, but finally settled on the current arrangement by prefix, which may not be the most popular but which elecits the fewest complaints. The Calendar was bare except for the upcoming Kingman/Palmyra operation by K6LPL, Their small plane crash-land-WA6YQW, and WA2FIJ. ed on Palmyra, injuring WA6YQW and ending her participation, but the others continued. Both ZLIADI and ZLIAMO were visiting China. ZS2MI had four months left on Marion Island...that was the last activity from there. The Colvins were in the Caribbean, operating from St. Lucia and Martinique. Finally, we noted that eleven countries had had changes in government in 1979: Cambodia, Ethiopia, Grenada, Uganda, Nicaragua, Annobon, Central African Republic, El Salvador, S. Korea, Chad, and Afghanistan. Since then, there has been amateur radio activity from all but Ethiopia and Afghanistan.

The Amateur Radio Society of India says that VU2IF is operating ATØA from Antarctica, now until March; QSL to his home call ... K3TG will operate from 4UlVIC in Vienna in late March; a few people are still pushing for DXCC status for the Vienna International Center...DXAC vote on the Pribilofs is stalemated, and a re-vote may be called for... First Call Area QSL Bureau may be re-organized under new leadership, but nothing is definite yet... KX6DS/N4TO writes that he's been on Since Dec 4, and his favorite hours are everything except when he's working (which is 18-00Z and 00-06Z); he likes 40 and 80, as you know, but 160 Meters is not allowed on Kwajelein. QSL to N. Alabama DX Club, PO BOX 4563, Huntsville AL 35815...

JAlHQG, QSL manager for XULSS, says he has logs only through mid-September, hopes to have later ones in a couple of months. We had heard that there was delivery as often as weekly. A few people have, however, received XUISS QSLs for contacts made during the CQ WW Contest in late November ... 4S7WP Shanti is recovering from typhoid fever and will be on the air again soon

Frank Schwab, W8OK, in charge of organizing a World Record CW Copying Contest for the Day-ton Hamvention, is quoted in the W5YI Report as saying there won't be any activity this year, because no one can agree on how to format the Contest. He says the Guiness Book of Records people had no advice. Since the record was set by T.R. McElroy (72.5 wpm) 45 years ago, seems to us that any run on that record should use the same format. We believe the original mark was set using plain text, including numbers. Note: the ARRL Board of Directors has been asked to set a standard (meaning it will take ten years, be wrong-headed, or

Regarding DXpeditions, I wasted a lot of time trying to find the VU7WCY boys, because of their choice of frequencies. suggest 14.020 on CW, to get away from the Extra Class band edge, which is often overcrowded, and on SSB outside the U.S. bands (e.g. 14.145, 21.245, etc).-- W9DH"

"I'm QSL manager for a number of DX stations, and answer 12-15K cards a year. Please tell new DXers to use UTC time and date, and never send a request without an SASE. Foreign hams should send at least two IRCs for an airmail reply. And be patient! Follow-up requests are not necessary...consider that I get logs from KC4AAA only once a year. Actually, experienced DXers (for example, TDXB readers - ed), know all this, but the crop of newer DXers need to be educated .-- K9AUB"
