KH6BZF REPORTS a sudden ionospheric disturbance began Apr 30, 0911Z, followed by a geomagnetic storm at 1330Z, "to round out a week of stormy/lousy MUF's, to put it mildly." The solar flux index has dropped from 128.7 in April 1984 to 75.16 in April, 1985. The approximate bottom is 69.0, expected to occur in about 1,000 days.

NOTES

IRAQ: YIIBGD reported on CW, Kamal at the key, worked in Europe at 1600Z on 14.047. Kamal is reportedly using one of the ARRL-supplied "WARC kit" transmitters. (DXPress).

GUERNSEY: GV4LIN will be a special event station commemorating WW2's end, May 9-11, all bands, including 160. Others are GV2VIE and GV4VE. GB0SGD is a special station from England for St. George's Day, now to May 18 (DXNS).

MONGOLIA: UZOSWW/JT active, worked 20 SSB May 5 at 1230Z from Massachusetts. This operation was apparently scheduled to run only until May 9.

NAVASSA 6Y5NR/KP1 made 11,500 contacts, 6Y5FS/KP1 about 1500. Both can be QSLed via 6Y5NR, although 6Y5FS cards can be had via GW3YDX.

An interesting letter from Europe contrasts the operations from Navassa and those of FOOXX..."I just barely caught 6Y5NR/KP1 on 20 Meters one afternoon. He was working simplex and not too strong. He stayed only a few minutes and was gone. That was Sunday, Apr 8. Worked FOOXX on 40 Meter SSB and moved down to 80, on the oft chance they might be there. They weren't, but 6Y5NR/KP1 was, on 3795, listening 3805, S9+! Some Europeans made contact by transmitting out of their band, but as it turned out they were the lucky few.

"I am surprised that so much negative has been said about FOOXX (in the European press) but little about the Navassa operation. Perhaps more was expected from the FOOXX group because of the hoopla and (monetary considerations). I was glad to work both of them, but it is annoying to lose a contact with them on the low bands when their signals are good and it looks so easy."

ST BRANDON 3B7 radio operations are now authorized only for residents of Mauritius, as SMOAGD found out; Eric reportedly had landing permission but not radio. The "3B7CD" on 20 and 40 CW at the end of April was obviously a pirate.

BURUNDI 9U5JB operation by ON5NT netted 7210 contacts, including many in Europe on all five bands 10-80 meters. One G station was worked on 24 MHz. Ghis reported generally good manners except for the notable exception of U.S. operators on 20. (DA2ER).

AFGHANISTAN: One YAIKBL was heard in Euope working a Russian station, in English (!) on 20 SSB Apr 17. Gave his address as Box 570, Kabul...

UGANDA: QSLs from the recent German operation are already hitting the mail, for 5X5BD (7000 QSOs) and 5X5WR (1200). Newington awaits paperwork before certifying for DXCC credit.

ON4UN, who will be a guest at the May 10 meeting of the So. New England DX Association, is the subject of some controversy in Europe. One publication there mentioned that during a morning 80 Meter opening to FOOXX, the only Europeans who got through were on an "ON4UN list." John didn't take kindly to that, saying he doesn't like list operations.

A perennial problem is when you're the loudest station on the band, there are always going to be people who get mad at you, and there's little doubt that ON4UN is one of the kings of 80 Meters. A friend of ours who was stationed in Antarctica in the early 1970's says that ON4UN was always the first European in on 80, the loudest, and the last out.

FROFLO, now signing FR5DX, was recently asked about QSLs, and he replied that he had a big box of them "to do soon." Herik is just one of those people who doesn't like the chore of answering QSLs.

DAYTON REPORT

Notables at this year's Dayton Hamvention included Mike Smedal, A71AD; Bob Walsh, WA8MOA, 160 Meter operator at HZ1AB and a member of the VKOCW/VKOHI team; ZL1AMO, and HB9AMO. The Kansas City DX Club did a new spoof, this one on contest calling to the tune of "Ghost Busters." New amps were shown by Henry and Amp Supply.

FCC ISSUES "R AND O" ON NEW FREQUENCY BANDS

In a report and order dated April 26, FCC indicated what would be happening on the 10 and 24 MHz bands. On the 10 MHz (30 Meter) band, there will be no change... ARRL's recommendation that the power limit of 200 watts (PEP), CW only, be retained was approved by FCC. ARRL argued that the power limitation was "consistent with the need to share (this) band with Fixed Stations worldwide."

FCC considered petitions that the 24.890-25.890 MHz band be limited to (1) novices only and (2) Advanced and Extra licensees only, but ruled that the band will be open to General licensees and above. FCC also considered petitions for reduced power levels on the 12 Meter band, but con-

cluded that no limitation was needed. There will be no "sub bands" on 12 Meters. FCC noted that the 24 MHz band is already allocated for amateur use in over 40 other countries, and phone/cw divisions would be on a voluntary basis "in a manner consistent with Region 2 IARU recommendations."

THE RULES AMENDMENTS ARE EFFECTIVE 0001UTC JUNE 22, 1985.

In another matter, that of station identification, FCC agreed with a petition filed by Dave Popkin, W2CC, that an order of last January 25 was confusing and almost completely precluded the transmission of any callsign other than one's own. Section 97.121 False Signals is modified as follows.

An amateur radio station must not transmit:

- (a) False or deceptive signals or communications by radio; NOR:
- (b) For purposes of identifying the station, any call sign which has not been assigned to it. Notwithstanding the foregoing, when a station is operated within the privileges of the operator's class of license but which exceed those of the station licensee, station identification must be made by following the station call sign of the station being operated with the operator's primary station call sign in accordance with Section 97.84 (b).

COMMENT

Last January, <u>TDXB</u> noted that the new rule still did not make clear whether it was legal to use your own callsign from another station. This is a matter which is of prime importance to contest operators and others who do not have a station of their own. Although each FCC license does specify a "fixed station location," you can move to another (unlicensed) location and use your assigned callsign while your FCC license is being modified.

However, if you operate from another station which is owned by an FCC licensee, and that location is specified as that licensee's "fixed station location," then clearly it is illegal to use your own callsign.

Unfortunately, this is going too far. The intent of the rule is to make it illegal for someone to use another's callsign without authorization. This is not likely to prevent "bootlegging," or pirating of callsigns.

What this new rule will make illegal is what we think is a perfectly legitimate activity...one licensee sitting down at another licensee's station and, with the station licensee's permission, using one's own callsign instead of the assigned station callsign.

Here is an example of who will be affected: a contest super station owned by an Advanced Class licensee, uses the callsign of one of their Extra class licensee operators. The new FCC rule makes this practice clearly illegal, and the team will now have to sign both call signs in order to remain legal.

The alternative is for one of the Extra class team members to move his "fixed station location" on his FCC license to the contest station site. That would actually not be a problem, because then the Extra class licensee could still use his own call from his house, since it would then be an "unlicensed location." There is no limit to how many people can be licensed at the same location!

BAND COUNTRIES COLUMN

QST CONTENT

A recent survey of ARRL members asked them what they would like to see in <u>QST</u>. Given that there are a limited number of news pages in any magazine, based on number of pages of advertising, something has to be taken away in order for something else to be added. Far and away, the <u>QST</u> readers said the thing to <u>take away</u> was contest results.

Now, we have personal experience here. There was a time when contest page space was almost entirely based on the verbosity of the contest editor. That is, you wrote it, they published it. Those days are long gone. The DX column does not get as much room as in the heady days of W9BRD. And we suspect that the DXCC Honor Roll has been cut back to once a year because of tightness of page space, too.

One way out of this dilemma is to publish specialty sheets for "targeted audiences." ARRL has long done this with the "CD Bulletin" (now QCD), and more recently with a technical newsletter and with the bi-weekly ARRL Letter. Indirectly, ARRL supports amateur satellite work by helping finance AMSAT, which publishes both a monthly magazine and a biweekly newsletter.

Do not be surprised if someday soon contest results are taken out of QST and offered to contest participants who send in logs in the form of a separate mailing. It is difficult to justify eight pages for Sweepstakes results in a magazine with a circulation of 150,000, when only 2,000 amateurs participate in the SS.

The DXCC program is on slightly better footing, because it is partially self sustaining. That is, you must be an ARRL member (if you're American or Canadian) in order to participate. The League cannot require membership for contest participation because that would most likely hurt partcipation in the events. The argument can and has been made that perhaps as many as thousands of ARRL members pay up each year just to get their DXCC certificates updated.
