•DL7FT/SV/A appeared on 20 CW Friday, Jun 27, claiming to have verbal permission to operate from Mt. Athos, but we have no further information.

•S92LB is the former CR5LB (and S9RLB), and he's in the Callbook. DXCC credit should be OK. The address is Luis Soares Beirad, Box 147, Sao Tome.

•WH60 not only came on /KH4 Midway as promised but also went to Kure and was worked by a few from there. He turned up on the 14.309 net and only on 20 SSB, as far as we know.

•KA4JRY/TT8 has appeared from Chad; he's in the States on vacation now until the end of July, but will be back and forth to Chad for a year. The Kansas City DX Club reportedly has word that N7DF will be assigned to the U.S. embassy in Chad for 90 days sometime soon, and hopes to operate from there. He's reportedly also looking at radio possibilities in the Sudan and South Sudan.

•Regarding Thailand, W6YY writes that although the minister of communications there lifted the ban on amateur radio back in January, the Thai PTT has decided to withhold this authority pending examination of all would-be amateurs. Amateur radio has always been in a sort of twilight zone there, with the radio club in charge of issuing callsigns. Club members are afraid that after the examinations, which are expected to begin soon, new callsigns will be issued.

The RSGB News Sheet reports that the UNICEF ham club of Japan will sign HS0IYY July 26-29, and QSLs will be via JA8ATG.

•George Wagner will be K5KG/VS6 July 7-16, including the IARU Radiosport Contest July 13 and 14. He will work both CW and SSB during the contest. At his sunrise (2150Z) and sunset (1108Z) he will be on 3505, 7005, 3795, and 7085. In addition, he has schedules with HZ1AB on July 13 and 14 as follows: 28.010 (1000Z), 21.010 (1030Z), 14.010 (1800Z), 7005 (1600Z), and 3505 (2100Z).

•ARRL now accepts all QSLs from 5X5BD and 5X5UR for operations this past spring, plus QSLs from 5X5GK for contacts dated on or after August 28, 1984.

•KC6JC aims for an operation from the Western Carolines (he's stationed on the Eastern Carolines) July 30 to Aug 21. Problem is, he says he will have very little time for radio, will have only a poor antenna. Look for him probably only on 3806.

However, this could be affected by the assassination of Palauan president Haruo I. Remeliik, on June 30. Palau, part of the Western Carolines U.S. trust territories, is in the process of claiming independence but is experiencing considerable political turmoil.

The problem is that the Paluans required, as part of the separation agreement, that their island would be free of nuclear material and weapons. The U.S. refuses to agree to those terms.

•CE0AA QSLs are still a sore spot...many cards are coming back through QSL bureaus, in answer to requests which were accompanied by money or IRCs, and the speculation is that the envelopes were opened and the money removed in Chile, then forwarded to the Radio Club. The only known sure-fire method of getting your card back quickly is to send to CE3ESS, registered mail.

•T31AT was originally scheduled to be active only until about July 7, but ARRL's bulletin last week said he will be there until July 30. He likes the net gathering on 14.309 around 0400Z, and from there can be talked into going to 40 Meters. No CW, apparently. QSLs to G4GED.

•Stations in Massachusetts worked 3H8C on Jun 29, around 0000Z on 7001; said QSL to Box 148, Cheugdu, China. The operator reported that a number of special callsigns are expected momentarily, including BA0A, 3H0P, XS2PC, XS2WC, and 3H8C.

BY0AA, from Xinjuan Uyur, is in CQ Zone 23, as is BT0NM, which is a base camp of the Japanese-Chinese joint mountain climbers expedition to Namunani Peak. JH1KRC says that the Japanese team has climbers from Kyoto and Doshisha Universities. One member of the Chinese team is a radio operator who speaks fluent Japanese.

Both stations have been reported on 20 Meters 1400-1500Z, around 14.005 and 14.190.

Finally, two more Japanese operations from China were to have taken place...BT1HHL from Beijing Jun 13-16 (QSL JR1HHL), and BT4KJU from Shanghai Jun 16-18 (QSL JA1RJU).

•Jim Smith, P29JS/VK9NS reports there is a "very good possibility" that there will be another scientific team visiting Heard Island this summer (that means like next January of February). One reason for the visit would be to tend to the weather station which Smith's group, the H.I.DX. A., put there in 1983.

Another reason for the visit would be that Heard's volcano, Big Ben, has been active this year, with passing ships and also the French on Kerguelen reporting sightings. Smith is interested in a return to Heard Island, but is still financially strapped from the expedition two years ago.

•QRZ DX says W6DMJ will accompany K8CRM to Johnston for a five day operation beginning either July 21 or 25.

•First word on the Southeastern DX Club's DXPO to be held Sept 27-20: featured DXers will be W6OAT of the Clipperton operation last spring, Carl and Martha Henson, with the first showing of slides of their 3C1 Equatorial Guinea operation, and ON4UN of 80 Meter fame. Further information can be had from the Club, via Grover Meinert, KC4BX, 720 Starlight Lane NE, Atlanta GA 30342.

•Several of our Japanese readers have noted they still need a contact with 4U1UN on Manhattan Island. One of them asks why the station is so weak, compared with other stations in the area. Back on June 16, several visiting Japanese operated the station during the All Asian Phone Contest, but the operation was not very productive. The inexperienced operator, frustrated with the contest QRM and his own weak signal from 4U1UN, moved around instead of staying on one frequency. He called the JA's with big signals, i.e., the ones who undoubtedly have worked 4U1UN already.

Another depressing thing about looking at the Survey sheets as they come in is the number of JA's who missed Malpelo back in October, 1983, and the Europeans who still need Clipperton and Revillagigedo.

There is still time not only to return your filled-out Survey sheet, but also to try your hand at predicting the Top 20 for 1985. We plan to tabulate the results in about two weeks.

•CORRECTIONS: the editor of Canada's Long Skip is VE3XN, ex-VE3GCO. And the problem reported in the newsletter of the YCCC (Yankee Clipper Contest Club) is that key clicks are generated by the TS930 when using Fox Tango CW filters (not SSB filters).

Two recent happenings have brought an avalanche of mail regarding DXCC and the Honor Roll, in particular.

First was the death of Don Wallace, W6AM, and second was the article in July CQ Magazine about W6ODD's operations in the late 1940's.

The controversy is about what DX'er has "them all"; indeed, about the definition of "them all." The problem is related to the one we have wrestled with about our band-countries listings, which we hope to make a permanent, occasional column in TDXB.

In our band countries listings, the hangup is current DXCC countries only vs. all-time countries, including the many which are now deleted from the DXCC list.

In the case of the Honor Roll, the groundrules would seem to be obvious; virtually hundreds of DXers have all 315 current countries, so it is necessary to talk about all-time, to reduce the field of contenders.

But there is still disagreement. For example...many of us know at least one DXer who claims to have worked "them all," or nearly so, but has never bothered to apply for DXCC or to participate in the Honor Roll chase.

W1FH claims to have them all, i.e., to have worked and confirmed all 367 DXCC countries which have existed since World War 2. He dropped out of DXCC and had his callsign removed from the Honor Roll in 1966, in protest

over the ARRL vs. Don Miller, W9WNV affair.

And he was not alone.

Occasionally, a package of QSLs will arrive at the DXCC Desk, from someone who has never applied for DXCC, and that someone will have enough pasteboards to put him or her instantly on the Honor Roll.

Finally, there are several DXCC participants with enough credits to be on the Honor Roll, perhaps even at the top, who have asked that their callsign not appear in QST. Only the DXCC Desk knows who they are and where they would stand in the listings.

W1WY, writing in August CQ Magazine, notes the passing of W6AM, and mentions that at the time of his death Don was working to have the Guinness Book of Records list him as holding the "record for the most countries contacted by an amateur radio station." To those who see W6AM listed at 366 and W1GKK at 367, this will be difficult to comprehend.

Don may have been including countries before World War 2 as well as after.

July CQ's article on W6ODD quotes him (W6ODD) as saying the only New England station worked from W6ODD/CR8, Diu Island, was W1FH, and also that W6AM failed to work him. In this case, India annexed Diu Island almost immediately thereafter, and the country was deleted, so W6AM could not catch up.

Those who have questioned the top spot ask how W1GKK could have had credit...the

answer is that he had worked Diu before the W6ODD/CR8 operation, and before it was put on the DXCC list. But, in those days, a contact before the country was on the list counted. Such is not the case today.

As it turns out, W1GKK many years later submitted his Diu QSL for credit, and got it.

You can track this...in the October, 1981 Honor Roll, W1GKK stood at 317 out of 318, with 365 all-time. A year later, he was listed at 318 and 367, after he submitted his W6ODD/CR8 Diu QSL, plus the card from one current country he had been missing the year before.

So the struggle for the top really comes down to who has all 367. There may be old timers hiding in the wings who have. W1FH may have, although the DXCC Desk has not seen the cards.

Isn't it fascinating to think that someone may be lurking with all the cards (367)? We think we know a W1 now living in the south who might fit that description. But anyone who has held out for decades is probably unlikely to come forward now with the application.

Isn't it time this matter was settled? It would be great to see another amateur radio record in the Guinness book, in addition to the recent entry for KV4AA.

We in the DX community will probably be called on to decide the criteria for this entry, and it's time to think about who the final arbiter will be.
