**EQUATORIAL GUINEA/ANNOBON.** Word is EA8CR and two others have licenses for 3C1 Oct. 4-10, followed by 3C0.

**A7XAH in QATAR** should be active again starting the first week of October, after a stay in the UK. Two spots to watch are 14225 and 14305.

Latch onto Guernsey Island's most active amateur, Dale Jones, GU5CIA, before he leaves at the end of September. Dale will be reassigned to Oregon after that, signing K5MM/7. A new Guernseyan should appear soon, signing GU4IOU, in the person of an up-and-coming 16-year old, according to Dale. Since May 21, 1978, GU5CIA has tallied 41,500 contacts in 237 countries. Dale has worked all 50 states on 10-40 but still needs six on 80 (didn't say which ones).

During his time at the ZK1MB Manihiki operation, Chuck Rademacher, ZL1ADI suffered a serious injury. While they were unloading their gear a tractor rolled over Chuck's leg, which subsequently became infected. A doctor from a nearby island saved the day with antibiotics and Chuck was later well enough to climb some trees for antenna-stringing duty. He says next stop is ZM7.

ICELAND is the destination of AF9K, WB9UXR and WB9TOU, where they expect to be on the air October 8 through14. QSLs will go to each operator's home call address. They are contemplating 48 hours of activity from Westman Island, where the prefix would be TF9 (for you prefix chasers). That would take place Oct. 10 and 11.

Another W9DXCC meeting is history. Aside from the published program which went off on schedule, some awards were presented...#1 Honor Roll plaques went to W9JUV and W9DWQ; a special award went to Jerry Swetsky, WB9EBO, for his tremendous dedication to the W9 QSL Bureau. The Northern Illinois DX Association "Member of the Year" award went to Ken Neuffer, W9ZA. Following the banquet and his slide show on the 1S1DX expedition, Stew Woodward, K4SMX, was presented with the best award of all: \$120 collected toward defraying the costs of that plagued but eventually highly successful jaunt.

After much hesitation, we reluctantly also record one final award presentation. The dreaded "DX Hog of the Year" symbol, a grotesque plastic pig mounted unceremoniously atop a garbage can lid, made its way to the podium in the hands of last year's recipient Dave Zeph, W9ZRX (a most worthy one himself). Dave, gloating at the promise of ridding himself of the horrible thing, did the dirty deed of announcing that the assembled multitude had voted to assign the albatross to the neck of none other than Norm Meyers, N9MM, for having been the most active W9 DXer of the year preceding. Not a hint of remorse was visible on W9ZRX's face as he handed over the ugly pig to his "friend" Norm. As Dave put it, "My wife will sure be glad to have that thing out of the living room." And thus ended the 1979 W9DXCC meeting.

**GENEVA** news...The WARC American "team members" have been given special third party authorization for the use of 4U1ITU for messages to the USA. Other countries have their telecommunication as a government owned facility and are given free telephone privileges for their team members.

The USA has private telecommunications so its privilege is in the form of third party traffic via 4U1ITU. This authorization is for the duration of WARC and US amateurs are advised that requests for phone patches by Americans operating 4U1ITU are perfectly legitimate...This is official news direct from one of the Americans going to Geneva for the WARC.

The Amateur Radio Society of Ireland will sponsor special events station EJ2PV sept. 29 to Oct. 1, during a visit by the Pope. Operation will be on "all bands and modes."

#### CQ Magazine 5-Band WAZ Program Update

In December, 1978, CQ announced their 5BWAZ; offered was a certificate for 100 band-zones, endorsement stickers for levels between 100 and 200, an "Honor Roll" at the higher levels, and a plaque to every DXer confirming all 200 band-zones. A fee was charged for the initial award, for each endorsement, and for return postage and registered mail.

The October, 1979 issue of *CQ* reveals, in the "Zero Bias" editorial, a "reorganization" of the 5BWAZ. After admitting that the program was started "without being prepared to adequately support it, both in administrative procedures and in actually having award material to distribute," *CQ* editor K2EEK describes the following changes in the program: applications will be accepted only from those having *all 200* band-zones, and only the first five successful applicants will receive plaques. All thereafter will get certificates.

The DX Bulletin has the following comments regarding this matter:

1. Since working all 40 CQ Zones on each of five bands will require great dedication, and will mean considerable expense in obtaining QSLs, applicants would undoubtedly be willing to assume the cost of

their plaques. So, why stop at five only?

2. What about those who have already spent considerable sums of money in getting QSLs, submitting them to CQ for certificates and stickers, and may not be in the top five for all 200 band-zones? As one correspondent told The DX Bulletin, "I already have 5BDXCC, WAZ, and over 300 countries; the hundred bucks I have spent so far for band-zone QSLs is down the drain since the cards aren't needed for anything else." If this DXer is "beat out" of the first five, we doubt he will spend another hundred dollars to get a piece of paper for an award.

3. The administrative, bookkeeping nightmare an award like 5BWAZ presents for its sponsor is obvious. It is not difficult to understand that *CQ* must curtail the program somewhat and we commend them for doing it now, before more DXers are disappointed. To be fair, all intermediate certificates and stickers must be withheld, even from those who have submitted cards and funds. However, those DXers who have invested in the intermediate steps should be compensated in some way, best left to the aggrieved parties.

The DX Bulletin recommends that CQ consider making the plaque available to all who qualify for 5BWAZ; if they do not, it is doubtful many will continue their efforts, and the program will die. Or maybe that is what CQ wants. — Editor.

# THE DX BULLETIN 1979 WEEKENDER TROPHIES

Introduction. The CQ Worldwide DX Contest, held in October (phone) and November (cw), offers the two best weekends of the year for DXers. Whether one is chasing overall countries/zones, or band-countries/zones, the two weekends ordinarily bring out plenty of at least semi-rare DX. George Jacobs, W3ASK, predicts the "best conditions in 20 years" in his propagation column in October CQ. Whether one despises contests per se has little bearing on leisurely chasing DX during these two weekends.

CQ itself and various trophy donors cover most areas, within the framework of the contest: available are single band certificates (and trophies), national champion trophies, continental trophies, etc. The one exception is for strictly multiplier chasing, i.e., countries and zones, regardless of number of contacts. Therefore, The DX Bulletin will award two trophies (one phone and one cw) to the single operators working the greatest number of countries plus zones, per the CQ rules. NOT band multipliers but total different multipliers, regardless of band. That is, one might work 110 multipliers on 10 Meters, 4 additional on 15, 11 additional on 20, for a total of 125.

The rules appear below and will be listed each week through the end of November, for maximum exposure. Just think — you can win a trophy and only have to work one station in each country and zone all weekend!

## RULES, THE DX BULLETIN 1979 WEEKENDER TROPHY COMPETITION

1. Eligibility: All individual subscribers to The DX Bulletin are eligible. One must be a subscriber prior to the weekend in which he or she competes.

2. All CQ WW DX Contest rules apply as to dates, times, log keeping. The entrant must submit an official entry to the CQ Con-

test Committee per their rules.

3. The entrant must comply with all recognized rules for single-operator stations, i.e., absolutely no help of any kind, including spotting nets, phone calls, etc. In addition, the entrant must operate a station located in the dwelling in which he or she permanently resides - no "guest operators."

4. The entrant shall submit an exact copy of his official CQ entry, plus an alphabetical-by-prefix list of countries worked and a numerical list of CQ Zones worked (1-40), to The DX Bulletin.

5. Any entrant who wins a regular *CQ* contest trophy will not be eligible for a Weekender trophy.

6. The top entrant each weekend will receive a trophy. In case of a tie, duplicate trophies will be awarded.

7. Results will be published in The DX Bulletin and will also be made available to CQ Magazine for their use.

8. In case of dispute, the decisions of The DX Bulletin staff will be final.

9. Mailing deadline for entries to the Weekender Trophy Competition are the same as those for official CQ entries.
