PROPAGATION FORECAST: Sept. 6, High/Low Normal; Sept. 7, High Normal; Sept. 8, 9, 10, High Normal; Sept. 11, High/Low Normal; Sept. 12, Low Normal; Sept. 13, 14, 15, High/Low Normal; Sept. 16-20, High Normal. TNX N4XX.

BAJO NUEVO/SERRANA BANK is just about completed when you read this. The group was about 24 hours late getting to HKØAB Bajo Nuevo, and thus about the same time behind schedule getting to HKØAA Serrana Bank. They are between the two spots as this is written. QSL information: the box number (584) printed last week is correct; the callsign should be HK3DDD, not HK3BDD (which is what the official press release from the radio club said).

ZL1AMO AND ZL1AZV CONTINUE active from the Pacific. hey operated as A35EA and A35TW, respectively, from Tonga, then last week as ZK2EA and ZK2TW. QSL CW contacts to ZL1AMO and SSB contacts to ZL1AZV. Their callsigns for Western Samoa 5W1 Sept. 4-7 were not known at presstime. After that they are back to Tonga Sept. 8-13.

JUAN FERNANDEZ As of Sept. 3 nothing heard of the CEØCJA operation which was planned to start Sept. 1.

JUAN DE NOVA (TDXB Issue 52, p. 1) is now expected to begin September 14; the group still leaves Germany on the 9th.

INDIAN OCEAN OPERATION by AA6AA and N6ZV continues; KA6S has returned to the States. Following their operations as 3B8ZV, 3B9ZV, and AA6AA/3B8, the two operated from the Comoroes as D68XX and D68GA. QSLs for these go to ZLIBIL. Please send only one envelope per operation, and separate envelopes for each operation/callsign.

At last count about 8,000 contacts had been made from the Comoroes. They are using "standard" DX frequencies except 7070 on 40 Meter phone. There has been no 160 Meter operation. Some contacts were made from the FRØFLO station and QSLs for these should go to his address.

Next stop, which might be in progress at this time, is Tromelin, for which they reportedly do have a license. After that, operations from 5Z4 and TL8 are possible.

FRANZ JOSEF LAND'S ONLY OPERATOR UAIPAL is expected to leave September 15, and will not be replaced in the foreseeable future. He has been very active the past two weeks or so on 15 and 20, both CW and SSB.

ET3PG operations have ceased for the present, reasons not known. J28AZ has also not made his proposed visits to Addis Ababa (Issue 51).

BAND CONDITIONS appear to be several weeks ahead of what they were two years ago; 10 Meters opened Aug. 29 Japan/East Coast, and 10 has in general exploded in the past two weeks, with all continents coming through with good signals. Low band reports are also starting to pick up as static diminishes. The disturbance predicted for Aug. 30 happened about 12-24 hours late, and was of short duration.

PZIDR and his manager WD4NBX have a regular schedule on 14240 at 1230Z, after which PZIDR ususlly moves above 14280 to work others. WD4NBX is John M. Kemp, PO BOX 955, Lebanon, TN 37087

Jack Sproat, YBØACL/W4LCL leaves Indonesia Sept. 14 after 14 months there. He was on the air for nine months and made over 12,000 contacts on 10 and 15 Meters, using an HW-101 and low two -element quad. Understandably, his manager W4QO has not yet caught up with the QSL demand, and Jack will be helping as soon as he returns (to Florida) and gets settled. ARRL News is that their cash flow position continues excellent and their financial situation is stable. They are now operating "comfortably in the black." The latest Assistant Dir ectors' Letter lists the companies which are not allowed to advertise in QST: DSI, Bash, SST Electronics, Communications Technology Group, Long Path Radio, Daring On Industries, and Bilal Co. These are all for bad customer relations, unacceptable products, and one for rubber checks...but Bash is excluded for compromising the FCC examinations...articles on Bash's study guides have appeared recently in other amateur magazines.

ARRL is now putting out a monthly news sheet aimed at the public relations and FCC crowds. The latest issue features amateurs' activities associated with the Mt. St. Helens volcano eruption. On the international scene, the news sheet advises that the Liberian Minister of Posts and Telecommunications recently announced that amateur radio is being restored in that country. The newly formed Solomon Islands Radio Society has been accepted into IARU membership, the 111th such member. H44 has thirty licensed amateurs, mostly in the capital city of Honiara.

GOT TIME? GOT MONEY? Read this anyway. Lindblad Tours of New York and Westport Conn offers their "Explorer" cruise, which begins in Singapore on a ship which carries 92 persons and a "fleet" of inflatable rafts called zodiacs for shore excursions. They stop first in Malaysia, followed by Christmas Island, then Cocos Islands, Kerguelen, Heard, McDonald, Bouvet, and Ushaia at the very tip of South America. And (are you ready?) it only costs \$15,430 for a private room (air fares extra).

If the Dayton Hamvention is any indication we could cram at least ten hams into that room.

OY7ML sends money for a subscription and says please cease and desist sending cards for the following pirates: OY2LP, OY4NA, OY5CD, OY7G, and OY5JA. Club station OY6FRA will be active in the coming contests, with a new beam on an eighteen meter tower. OY7ML is the only Faroes station active on 160 Meters.

HK3LR/MM was the boatload of Colombian hams on their way to Bajo Nuevo. You can get a special QSL card through the expedition route of HK3DDD, Box 584 Bogota.

TR8EE is new to Gabon, origin unknown, will be there about two more weeks.

The German DARC DX News Letter advises "DK3FW/YI with TS120 and Windom for longer time active. 21178 SSB 1650. On Christmas vacation in DL then again back to YI." We have neither heard, nor heard of, this station.

C31QG (DL7QG) and C31QH (DL7UN) will be on Sept. 5-16, including operation in the WAE Phone Contest Sept. 13-14, mostly on 10, 15 and 20 Meters.

The <u>VP2KC</u> contest team, which set an all time multi-transmitter record in the *CQ World-wide DX Phone Contest* last year, will NOT be back there this time, but several of the team members are looking for a "serious contest station from which to operate this year." Australian novices have both phone and CW privileges on 10, 15 and 80 Meters, low power. The license is a lifetime one, if desired. Rumors coming out of Washington indicate that the U.S. novice license, now five years and renewable upon retaking the examination, may revert to being time restricted.

Latest issue of the National Contest Journal is out (\$5/year, PO Box 732, Round Rock, TX 78664). After changing editors a year ago, the NCJ is now going to rotate between members of their Board, changing editors every year. Next in line is K5RC, followed by W2GD, KØTO, and N6SF. The NCJ is composed almost entirely of thoughtful letters and articles written by subscribers.

It is significant that DXing is the only facet of amateur radio which is able to support custom newsletters and bulletins on a more-often-than-monthly basis. The NCJ is published only six times per year.Of course, contest news does not have the critical time value that DX news does.

Another interesting newsletter is Mail-A-Prop by George Jacobs, W3ASK, PO Box 1714, Silver Spring MD 20902. It is a super propagation forecast every other week, and a two-month trial subscription is available for \$6. Annual sub. is \$30.

CONVENTIONS COMING UP include the W9DXCC, DXPO 80, Houston COMvention, and the NEDXCC Scrodfest. At least two of these will include the "14 Greatest DXpeditions of All Time" presentation by Hugh Vandegrift, WA4WME. Below is his official press release on the presentation, which is "non-commercial and purely for the enjoyment of hams":

The 14 greatest DXpeditions segment (prior to the Clipperton's segment) is not meant to be a substitute for the full length mono-DXpedition presentations currently on the hamfest and banquet circuits, i. e., N200 or K4SMX with Spratly, NØTG with Navassa, Ed Cushing with San Felix, et. al. WA4WME's show is a few slides of each of the greatest DXpeditions to allow audiences the chance to see and hear the logistical problems, personal sacrifices, and dangers involved in planning great efforts in DXpeditions and to see color slides of the operators, operating stations, and geographical environments of each great DXpedition. For over two decades, Clipperton Atoll remained #1 on most versions of the DXCC Most Wanted Countries List. Over 4 years went into the planning of this trip in which 17 amateurs representing 3 countries journeyed 1800 miles into the vast Pacific Ocean west of Panama and in six days captured over 29,000 QSOs world-wide on seven bands. Clipperton Island is an uninhabited remote volcanic atoll used by the French Navy for nuclear weapon testing. The fantastic logistics and adventure of this DXpedition is narrated live by WA4WME with the support of the best movies and slides taken by the entire Clipperton team. The movies and slides are shown simultaneously on adjoining screens in a unique method of synchronization wherein the subject matter (on both screens) is always kept related. This is the chance to hear the monumental logistical details and political intrigue involved in planning a DXpedition of this magnitude--a \$42,000 venture, the most expensive single DXpedition in history. This is the chance to see and hear about the top 17 DXpeditions of all time. Don't miss it -- come early -- and enjoy informal contacts with friends and chat with our guest speaker. I understand that ITU has assigned a prefix for North Korea. My question, then, is how come North Korea has not been added to the DXCC list of countries?

Ah, you say, there are no operators or operations from there. Well, then it would appear that the main consideration for a country to have DXCC status is that there must be operators and operations allowed. Agreed?

My next question is, how come we have places like China and a host of others where there has not been operations for years and probably will not be for a good many to come, if ever, and these countries are still carried on the DXCC list?

I agree with K5YY, and his talk at Dayton last May (April - Ed.), that the DXCC and the Honor Roll should not be easy to come by, but...it should not be something that is impossible to get. I think that under the present setup that is what we have.

I would like to propose the following for thought and discussion:

Why can't we take countries that have been inactive for years and remove them from the DXCC list and place them in what could be called a "suspended" or "inactive" status, until the time that operations do take place?

- (1) A time limit before suspension might be five or, maybe ten years. Maybe even a sunspot cycle.
- (2) They would still count for country totals for those that had worked them.
- (3) They would not have to be worked again by those already having them in their country total.

This would allow us poor souls that have little chance of ever getting on the Honor Roll a shot at the award. When China and the rest become active and are returned to the DXCC active list I would be more than happy to work them to remain on the H.R. The old chestnut about it being too much paperwork for ARRL is just not valid in my eyes. ARRL and DXCC is for the benefit of the membership and not the other way around.
